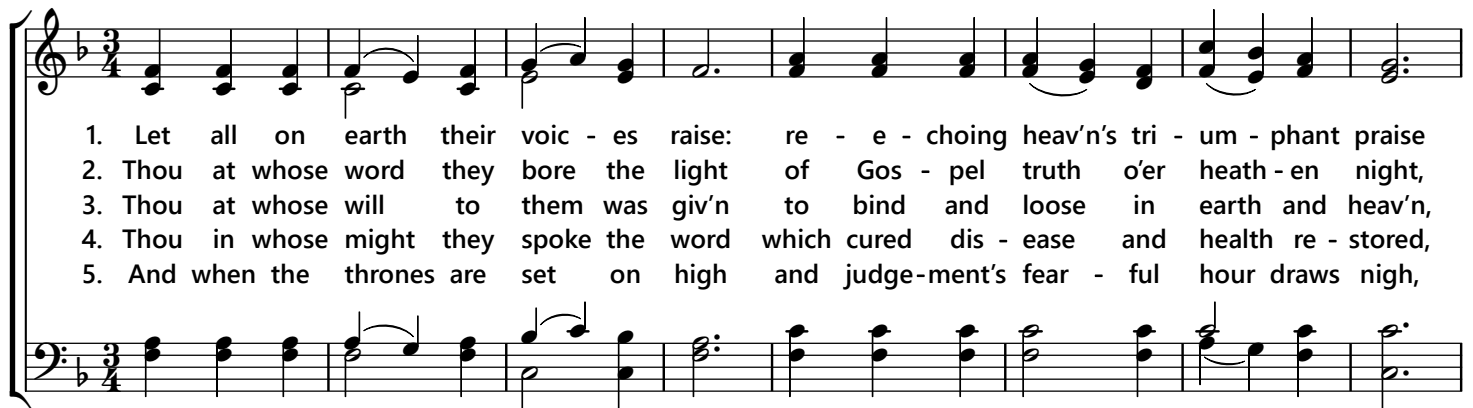
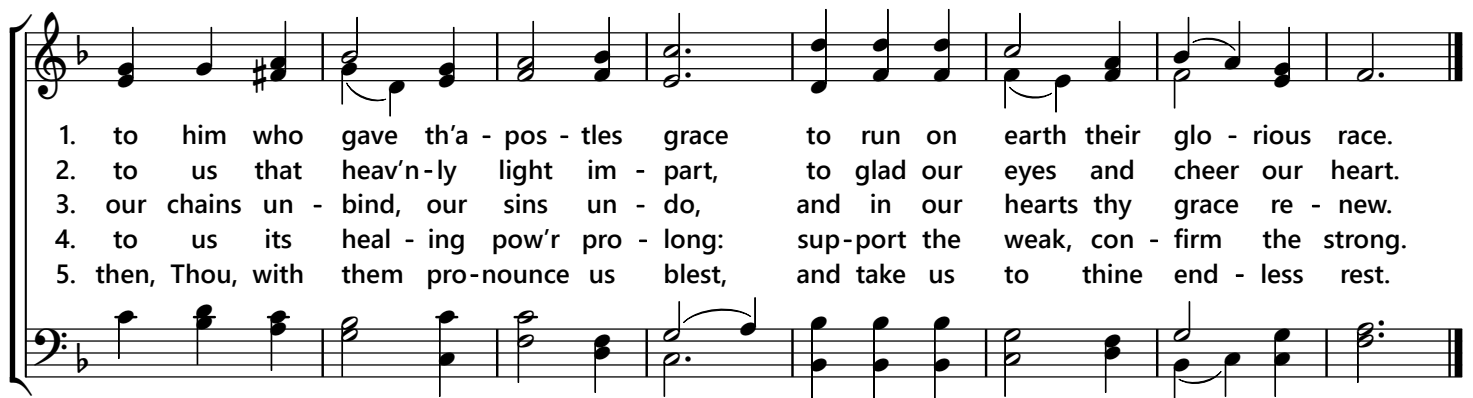


Exultet caelum laudibus
