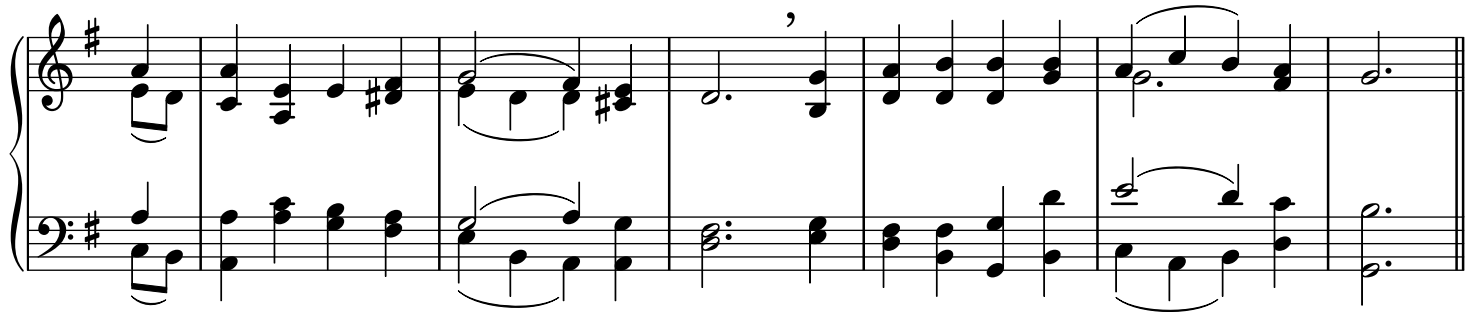
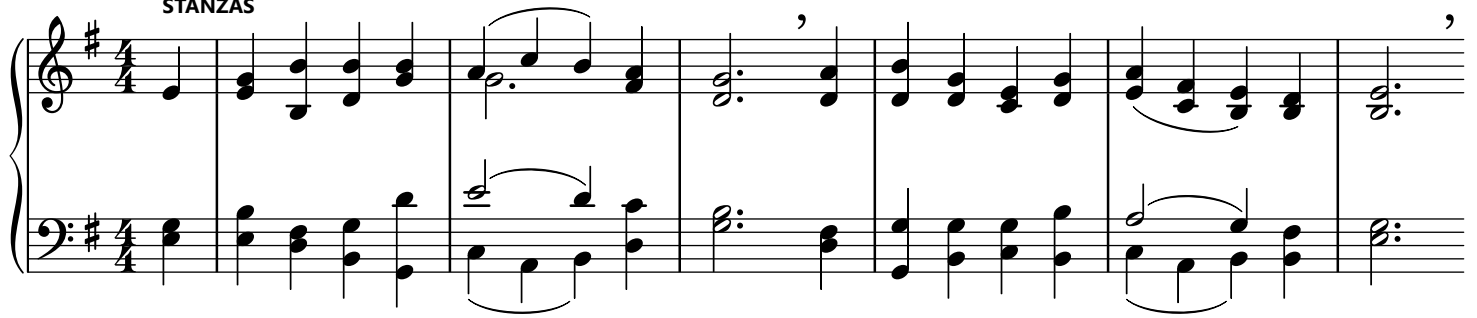


Veni, veni, Emmanuel
