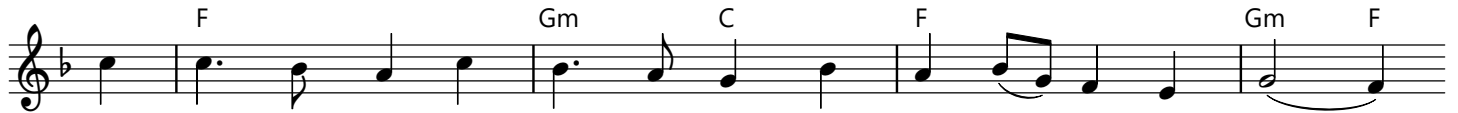


Your Hands, O Lord, in Days of Old

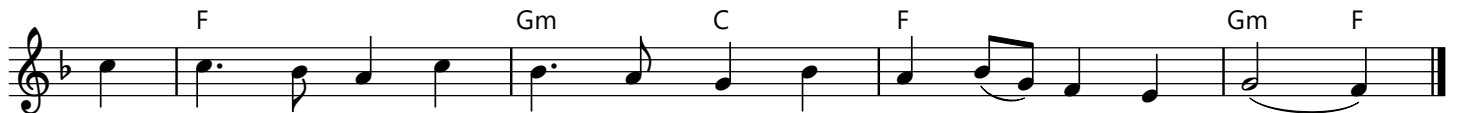
1. Your hands, O Lord, in days of old were strong to heal and save;
